Discerning God's Will

And the world is passing away along with its desires, but whoever does the will of God abides forever. 1 John 2:17

God's will is not some mysterious secret encoded thing that Christians seek to discover apart from Scripture. Nor do Christians ask God for signs as the way they expect God to reveal His will. **God's Word is how God reveals His will. God's Word and will are one in the same as far as we're concerned.** We can only be absolutely certain of the will of God when God's will is clearly expressed in Holy Scripture. For example, we know from the Bible with complete certainty that it is God's will to save everyone by bringing everyone to the saving knowledge of His Son, our Savior, Jesus Christ (1 Timothy 2:4). However, if we lack such a clear and explicit passage of Scripture to discern God's will (Romans 12:2), we may use biblical principles to guide our decisions. **But at this point the Christian is only making sanctified guesses as to which choices are God pleasing.**

So many times when we're facing difficult decisions, and aren't sure what to do next, Christians will frequently wish that God would just tell them what to do next? As children of the heavenly Father, we want to be obedient children. This makes us eager to know what God wants us to do in a given situation that requires a decision. **But as every seasoned Christian knows, God doesn't always reveal his good and perfect will to us. But God's plans and purposes often remain hidden.** And if God's will is ever discerned, it is typically only in hindsight.

God often purposely does not reveal His will to us in order to teach us how to walk by faith and not by sight. **For God wants us to trust in all of the promises that God has made to us in Christ even when we remain uncertain about what God's will is for other areas of our lives.** For even when God allows His agenda – or will – to remain hidden from view, **Christians are nevertheless called to believe that God is always working for our eternal benefit in and through Christ (Romans 8:28).**

There is a hidden blessing in the fact that God doesn't "micro-manage" every small part of our existence. We are not robotic androids that God has preprogrammed so that God manages our every move so that our will always conforms to His will. It's true that ever since Adam and Eve sinned, we lack free will in spiritual matters. **We cannot repent of our sins, nor return to God through faith unless God turns our will.** For God alone makes the unwilling willing to trust in Christ and then gives us the desire to do God's will. Even though our spiritual will is bound to sin, death, and the devil until Christ sets us free, **God very graciously gives us some amount of leeway and autonomy over our lives.**

God leaves many of life's small and even large decisions to us. **When it comes to earthly decisions, God does not destine fate to work in our lives in one predetermined way.** But in earthly matters God gives us the freedom to react in our own way and to make choices on our own. **We have the freedom for instance to choose who we will marry, where we will live, and what career we will pursue.** However, there are times when we would gladly give up some of this freedom so that God might intervene and impose His will upon the difficult situations facing us.

There are those times when we think that we would like just a little more direction from God as to what His will is for our daily lives. And yet it's **far better that God has given us some degree of autonomy to make our own sanctified decisions as to how we can best please God.** People who choose to live under the law enjoy no such freedom. **Those living under the law are simply forced to follow God's prescribed rules without the least bit of variation.** If they fail to follow the perfect law of God those living by the law will be held accountable and punished accordingly. **However Christians have been granted great Gospel freedom when it comes to making life decisions that are neither commanded nor forbidden by Scripture (Galatians 5:4).**

In such cases within the congregation we have the Christian freedom to come up with different solutions, to discuss and debate the differences in our plans, and then in Christian love to vote and decide which plan to go with. **We personally must never regard one solution as being better than all the rest, unless the Bible also makes that assertion.** Otherwise, in Christian love we should assume that each plan has as its goal to honor Christ. **But once a congregation votes on a way to proceed, then Christian love should supersede our will so that everyone accepts and gets behind the will of the majority.**

As Christians it's all right to be passionate about our plan so long as we don't insist that our way is the only way. The truth is: **If you are going to discern God's will it is often going to first require you to crucify you own will. This happens when we say to God with sincerity, "Not my will, but your will be done."** We may have the greatest solution based upon the soundest logic, however if we don't present it with love for others in mind it accomplishes nothing. **For we know from the Bible that it is never God's will that we should be divisive and create factions in the congregation by insisting upon our own way.** This may be how the world does it, but it is not how Christians are to act within the body of Christ.

There are those times when God's will is as clear as

day. As an example, in 1 Thessalonians 4:13 Christians are told, "For this is the will of God, your sanctification, that you abstain from sexual immorality." But there are also those times when God's will is not so clear to those within a congregation about what to do next. **In those moments, brothers and sisters in Christ assemble together not only to make decisions, but also to decide matters in a God pleasing way that brings glory to Christ in all that we say and do.** Otherwise Satan will have a field day as he causes needless divisions in the church. **We cannot impose our will as if we were certain that it were God's will.** Instead when God's Word expresses God's will on a matter that settles it. **And when God's Word is silent on an issue so that we don't know God's will we should allow love to rule in our hearts and in our actions by accepting the congregation's decisions.**

In such cases when God's will is not discernable, and

Christians bring forward more than one alternative, Christians should assemble to pray, to discuss, to vote, to announce the will of the congregation, to pray, **and then in Christian unity and love to graciously accept the will of the body of Christ without subverting the decisions the congregation has made just because they do not agree with the decisions made.** For love must rule on those matters left undecided by God's Word.

***Fall Pastors' Conference
What It Is and What I Learned***

What is a pastors' conference?

Twice a year, all of the pastors of the Central Illinois District of our church body—The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod—are to gather together to worship, be taught the Word of God, and to have fellowship with one another (all districts in the LCMS meet regularly, some once per year). Our most recent conference was held October 12–14 at Christ Lutheran Church in Normal, Illinois. Lately, our gatherings have been held at churches that have a meeting space large enough to accommodate over 150 pastors (active and retired) and their wives, who are invited to attend.

At these pastors' conferences, we always begin our time together worshipping in the Divine Service and receiving the Sacrament of Holy Communion. We typically have two key speakers that present a total of eight sessions between them on a variety of theological topics. At different times throughout our conference gathering, we hear reports about the district from the district president, from the head of education for the district, from the leader of missions for the district, and from the district's investment manager.

Other, more social events are also included, such as meal times, daily offices (Matins, Vespers), and a basketball grudge match between alumni from our seminaries in Ft. Wayne and St. Louis (I have yet to play in one of these games, but may one day soon!). I thoroughly enjoy attending these pastors' conferences as it is always beneficial to meet with brother pastors, to speak theologically with colleagues, and to be taught by well-educated scholars in our church body and beyond. It also allows me to visit and briefly explore areas of our district I would not normally get to see. And I was even able to take my family with me to a conference one year ago in the Quad Cities! Overall, the semi-annual pastors' conferences are well-worth the time and effort taken to attend.

What did I learn?

While I do not wish to take all the space needed to mention everything taught by the two conference presenters, which were Rev. Dr. Jeff Gibbs and Rev. Mark Surberg, I would like to highlight a few nuggets of wisdom from Dr. Gibbs. Dr. Gibbs is a professor of Greek and the New Testament at Concordia Seminary in St. Louis. His four sessions were about the Great Commission and the Great Commandment(s), the Beatitudes, righteous anger, and Christian greatness.

In his first session, Dr. Gibbs spoke on the natural flow of growth of the kingdom of God from the health and well-being of God's Church here on earth. After pointing out that the New Testament epistles are silent on the topic of sharing Christ with others, Gibbs comments that the bringing of the Gospel into the world will happen as a result of the body of Christ being healthy with the Gospel. Gibbs states, "If that health is present, then the mission/making of disciples will happen." This falls in line with Jesus' teaching about the good tree bearing good fruit (Matthew 7:17). When there is faithfulness to Christ and his Word, Christians will be ready and willing to share the good news as the Spirit provides them opportunity in their vocations.

In the second presentation, Dr. Gibbs made the point of properly understanding the context and place of the Beatitudes in Jesus' Sermon on the Mount. Because Jesus places the Beatitudes at the beginning of his great sermon, Gibbs argued that this serves as the doorway into the rest of the sermon, providing the proper understanding for the rest of Jesus' teaching. As such, the Beatitudes are to be viewed as statements of Gospel being proclaimed to sinners, announcing their status before God and what God promises them as a result by his pure grace. Concluding that point is the notion that the Beatitudes are not to be used as goals to be obtained by the person on account of their own works. Rather, the individual understands the promises God has made to the repentant sinner and then lives out his or her life in accord with Jesus' teaching to the redeemed.

In his third session, Dr. Gibbs tackled a somewhat obscure topic in Christian living: righteous anger. Dr. Gibbs observed that outrage and anger over just about any issue is the norm for our American culture. And it seems as though such emotion is lauded and praised, thus being acceptable behavior, even for the Christian. Countering that worldly understanding, however, Gibbs referenced various passages in the Old and New Testaments that caution strongly against Christians allowing anger any room in their lives. He cited the Sermon on the Mount in Matthew 5:21–26 as a starting point. Dr. Gibbs indicated that there are times when anger does occur quite easily and is common in the life of the Christian. But, coming from a standpoint rooted in the Gospel as portrayed in the Beatitudes, Gibbs commented, "There are other ways to react to evil in the world around us than this [anger]. Why do we not feel sorrow, or compassion, or love?" There is certainly room for all

of us as God's people to reflect on these Biblical teachings and to evaluate our own experiences with anger in our lives.

Concluding his quad of sessions, Dr. Gibbs taught on the subject of Christian greatness. For the foundation of his topic, Dr. Gibbs used the often misunderstood passage of Matthew 18, which houses the set of verses the Church has used as a primary text for its teaching on church discipline. What Gibbs recognized in this text, however, is the comparison Jesus uses of the greatest in God's kingdom with a child. What is contrary to our worldly way of thinking is that Christian greatness is not measured by what we have and can do, but instead by how much we need from God and from one another. This truly falls in line with the Christian understanding that we must receive all that we need for salvation from God alone. The more broken we are as sinners, the more God gives us of his grace. John the Baptizer announced this truth from John 3:30: "He [Jesus] must increase, but I must decrease." And Paul emphasizes this sentiment in 2 Co-

rinthians 12, where he says, Christ's "power is made perfect in weakness...for when I am weak, then I am strong" (2 Corinthians 12:9, 10). Understanding this need of all God's people impacts our treatment and consideration of others in a dramatic way as we seek to treat them as we would like to be treated (Matthew 7:12).

In Conclusion

It is always a blessing to hear the truth of the Gospel proclaimed and taught by brothers in Christ. I thoroughly enjoy attending these pastors' conferences and look forward to them greatly. It is a remarkable way to be fed with the forgiveness of sins and the grace of God in Christ Jesus. And I am pleased to be strengthened in that faith so that I can continue to share it with you, thanks be to God!
