# The Doctrine of Justification The Key to Luther and the Reformation

The end of October brings us again to the celebration of the Reformation, a big deal for us as Lutherans. On October 31, 2024, it will have been 507 years since Luther posted the Ninety-Five Theses on the door of the Castle Church in Wittenburg, Germany, the key act that sparked the Reformation. What was that moment all about? And what is the Lutheran Church supposed to be all about?

Let's dive in. Martin Luther was a typical German youth who had a few extra blessings. He was able to attend schools at a young age and was well on his way to becoming a lawyer. Two brushes with death altered Luther's direction in life. A knife blade seriously injuring his leg and his encounter with a horrendous thunderstorm were the culprits. Martin Luther was afraid for his earthly life, but even more so he was terrified of his eternal life. What would happen when he died?

Luther was taught, along with all of his fellow Catholics, that only the best Christians attain heaven at the moment of death. Everyone else must pay off penalties for sins in purgatory for an unknown amount of time. While not the same as hell, purgatory was a punishment no one ever wanted. Worse than that, Luther feared his sins were too great for him to work off or for God to ever forgive and he was obsessed with the terror that he could suffer in hell forever.

The Catholic Church had capitalized on this fear for the average Christian and provided ways to alleviate these worries. The Catholic Church had introduced several non-Biblical practices, such as the honoring of relics said to be holy and from the Bible times. Pray over the skull of John the Baptizer and you could be freed from time in purgatory. Pray the Lord's prayer while visiting a splinter of wood from Christ's cross and your punishment would be reduced. Eventually, it got to the point in Luther's day that simply buying an indulgence—a piece of paper authorized by the pope—would release a person, past or present, from purgatory.

What Luther was suffering from was a guilty conscience, and rightfully so. "For all have sinned and fall short of the glory of God," Paul wrote in Romans 6:23. Knowledge of sin brings the feeling of guilt and terror over sin, especially when there is an understanding that God is perfectly just and must punish sin, as Luther rightly believed. Naturally, we long for a remedy to this sinfulness and daunting reality of eternal punishment. The question is "What is the remedy?" and "How do we get it?" This would become better known as the doctrine of justification. That is, how one is made right before God.

The Church had introduced the practices of penance, relic veneration, and indulgence purchasing in recent centuries. At the point in his life where Luther committed to becoming a monk, he knew of no other options for the remedy to sin and guilt. But then, the best thing happened for Luther. He was assigned to teach books of the Bible at the University of Wittenburg. He was required to read the books of Genesis, the Psalms, Galatians, and Romans. This is where God opened Luther's eyes to the truth of justification. No one is made righteous by their own efforts. It is solely by the grace of God as received by faith that a person is justified before God.

Luther's encounter with the key passage of Romans 1:16 and 17 was crucial. There, Paul wrote, "For I am not ashamed of the gospel, for it is the power of God for salvation to everyone who believes, to the Jew first and also to the Greek. For in it the righteousness of God is revealed from faith for faith, as it is written, 'The righteous shall live by faith.'" The key points there are the Gospel as the power of God and that in the Gospel the righteousness of God is revealed. These words of Paul demonstrate that the righteousness of God is not attained through any work, but is solely a gift.

Justification then, how a person is made right or just before God, is completely the action of God. The Gospel is the message that states that Jesus Christ suffered and died in our place for the forgiveness of all sin. Christ Jesus has done the work. God tells us simply to believe that truth and that belief is what justifies us. Abraham believed and it was credited to him as righteousness (Genesis 15:6). "For God so loved the world that he gave his only Son that whoever believes in him should not perish but have eternal life" (John 3:16).

Here are a few more key passages upon which the doctrine of justification is founded:

Romans 3:21–25	But now the righteousness of God has been manifested apart from the law, although the Law and the Prophets bear witness to it—the righteousness of God through <i>faith</i> in Jesus Christ for all who <i>believe</i> . For there is no distinction: for all have sinned and fall short of the glory of God, and are <i>justified</i> by his grace as a gift, through the redemption that is in Christ Jesus, whom God put forward as a propitiation by his blood, to be received by <i>faith</i> .				
Romans 3:28	For we hold that one is <i>justified</i> by <i>faith</i> apart from works of the law.				
Galatians 2:16	We know that a person is not <i>justified</i> by works of the law but through <i>faith</i> in Jesus Christ, so we also have <i>believed</i> in Christ Jesus, in order to be <i>justified</i> by <i>faith</i> in Christ and not by works of the law, because by works of the law no one will be <i>justified</i> .				
Galatians 3:11	Now it is evident that no one is <i>justified</i> before God by the law, for "The righteous shall live by <i>faith</i> ."				
Galatians 3:23	Now before <i>faith</i> came, we were held captive under the law, imprisoned until the coming faith would be				

revealed. So then, the law was our guardian until Christ came, in order that we might be justified by faith.

Luther's encounter with St. Paul in these works allowed him to see the crucifixion of Jesus in the proper light. No longer did Luther fear Jesus as a harsh judge. Rather, he understood Jesus to be his champion, his Savior, the one who loved him so much that he died for him. Luther became more and more convinced of this doctrine that he rejected the false teachings and prescriptions of the Catholic Church, and it allowed him to stand firm against the pope. Relics, even if real, had no power. Purgatory was a made-up teaching of the church used initially to give hope to weak Christians but eventually utilized to capitalize on their fear of God's punishment. Indulgences were nothing more than worthless scraps of paper, better to be used for any other purpose.

For Luther and his fellow reformers, the doctrine of justification was everything. It has been said that the Christian Church rises and falls on the doctrine of justification. When Christians get this teaching right, there is great comfort and peace and joy, beyond compare and the Gospel of Christ is held in its proper place. When this teaching is wrongly understood, the rest of Christian faith is skewed as well. Because of justification by faith, we can rightly see the Sacraments as gifts of God that give faith and that we receive by faith. Gifts can be given to and received by anyone, and that is what God offers through his grace. If we are seen to play any role in our justification, then the Gospel is lost and the view of the Sacraments is corrupted. Baptism and the Lord's Supper become works we must perform, but are not seen as gifts and thus do not give grace, which is completely the opposite of what the Scriptures teach (Acts 2:38–39; 1 Corinthians 11:23–26).

To sum it all up, we use the words of Luther's explanation of the Creed, the beginning lines of each article:

I believe that God has made me and all creatures...

I believe that Jesus Christ, true God, begotten of the Father from eternity, and also true man, born of the Virgin Mary, is my Lord, who has redeemed me, a lost and condemned person, purchased and won me from all sins, from death, and from the power of the devil, not with gold or silver, but with his holy, precious blood and with his innocent suffering and death...

I believe that I cannot by my own reason or strength believe in Jesus Christ, my Lord, or come to him, but the Holy Spirit has called me by the Gospel, enlightened me with his gifts, sanctified and kept me in the true faith...

The doctrine of justification keeps Christ at the center and gives all glory to God. That is the key to understanding Luther, the Reformation, and Christianity in its purest form.
